Tolerance, charity and respect are at the heart of what it means to be a Somervillian. Above the doors of our chapel reads the phrase 'a house of prayer for all people'; let us wish that this building, and this college, is always a space of safety, creativity and reflection for all who pass through our doors. The generosity of our supporters has allowed us to continue to expand our efforts to honour our educational purpose, support our students, and create opportunities for those who have been denied them to realise their talent and academic potential. We also thank those who wisely governed the college or taught within its walls for their dedication and service. Finally, we reflect on all those Somervillians who have died. We take inspiration from their lives and their achievements, and we offer our condolences to those who mourn their loss. These women have been the life blood of this College. May they rest in peace, and live on in the memory and history of Somerville.

About Somerville Chapel

Welcome to our Chapel. Somerville was founded in 1879 as both the joint-first women's college at Oxford and the first college to be 'undenominational' – that is, unaffiliated to any particular church. This far-sighted decision allowed women of all faiths and none to be able to study at Oxford.

Accordingly, Somerville was never meant to have a Chapel – so how did it get here? In 1932, the adventurer, author, artist and former Somerville student Emily Georgiana Kemp came forward with a proposal. Inspired by her encounters with different faiths and philosophies during her travels in the east, she wanted to fund the creation of a unique college Chapel. Although dedicated to God, it would be 'A House of Prayer For All People' (a statement now inscribed above the front door) where those of different nationalities, faiths and perspectives could gather to pray, reflect, and discuss matters of philosophy, religion and spirituality.

The resulting building opened in 1935. It reflects a traditional Oxford chapel in its collegiate layout and its stained glass east window by Reginald Bell, depicting Christ at the gateway to the knowledge of life. Look around more closely however, and you might notice a few differences: our Theorama under the window (representing the 9 major world religions and humanism), the grand piano that stands in place of an altar, or the prayer mats in the corner for anyone in need of them.

As the decades have passed, we have embraced more and more the Chapel's multi-faith role. In 2001, we founded a choir and inaugurated a series of what has come to be called Choral Contemplations, Somerville's unique multi-faith reimagining of Oxford's Sunday evening Choral Evensong tradition. We pair talks on faith or philosophy by speakers from a diverse range of backgrounds and perspectives with beautiful music. **You are warmly welcome to join us every Sunday in term-time at 5.30 PM.**
